## 5. MINUTES OF THE TRANSPORTATION POLICY COUNCIL FOR THE HOUSTON-GALVESTON TRANSPORTATION MANAGEMENT AREA

DATE: Friday, September 23, 2022

The presiding officer, Chairman David Robinson called the Transportation Policy Council (TPC) meeting of September 23, 2022 at 9:30 a.m. to order.

Chairman Robinson made a statement to TPC members and others that he was the presiding officer at a meeting of the Transportation Policy Council being held in-person or by a video conference on Friday, September 23, 2022 and he was physically present at 3555 Timmons Lane, Houston, Texas 77027. Chairman Robinson attested that the meeting was open and accessible to members of the public. Chairman Robinson reminded each member of the governing body participating in via Zoom they must be visible and audible to be considered a participant in this meeting, and they must enable their video and microphone when responding to a roll call, voting on action items and asking questions

#### ITEM 1 & 2 CERTIFICATION OF QUORUM AND INTRODUCTIONS

Chairman Robinson recognized Ms. Allie Isbell, H-GAC, for the Certification of the Quorum and conducted the Roll Call of the TPC membership. Fourteen (14) members comprise a quorum. A quorum was declared present and recorded on the Roll Call, which is included with these Minutes as Attachment 1.

Mr. Craig Raborn announced that Ms. Neely Kim, Finance and Administration Manager, H-GAC would be leaving H-GAC and today would be her last day. Mr. Raborn acknowledged her service to the Transportation Department, H-GAC and to the Transportation Policy Council. Chair Robinson also thanked her for service to H-GAC and to the Transportation Policy Council. The Council recognized her service with a round of applause.

#### ITEM 5. APPROVAL OF FRIDAY, AUGUST 26, 2022 MEETING MINUTES SUMMARY

Secretary Nancy Arnold presented the August 26, 2022 Meeting Minutes summary to the Council. Secretary Arnold asked the Council for any modifications or corrections as presented. There were no modifications or corrections. A motion was made by Secretary Nancy Arnold and seconded by Chuck Wemple. The Council voted and approved the minutes summary.

ITEM 6. AMENDMENTS TO THE 2023-2026 TRANSPORATION IMPROVEMENT PROGRAM (TIP) AND THE 2045 REGIONAL TRANSPORTATION PLAN (RTP) REQUEST APPROVAL OF RESOLUTIONS 2022-33 AND 2022-34, JIM DICKINSON, H-GAC

Mr. Jim Dickinson, H-GAC, provided a presentation on Amendments to the 2023-2026 Transportation Improvement Program (TO) and the 2045 Regional Transportation Plan (RTP).

A summary of the amendments to the 2023-2026 TIP is included below for the Council's consideration.

- Add \$45K of Surface Transportation Block Grant (STBG) funding and 9K Transportation
  Development Credits (TDCs) to the Houston-Galveston Area Council's Liberty County and
  Montgomery County Mobility Plans project (MPO ID 16354/CSJ 0912-00-614) to cover
  increase consultant costs related to the development of remote presentations required by the
  COVID-19 outbreak and network modeling issues. (+\$45K; Total Cost: \$1.2M)
- Cancel the Metropolitan Transit Authority of Harris County's (METRO) US 290 Cypress HOV Ramp planning and design project (MPO ID 17010/CSJ 0050-06-088) and transfer its \$4.0M of Congestion Mitigation/Air Quality (CMAQ) funds to the construction phase (MPO ID 17041/CSJ 0050-06-093). Also, add the right-of-way (ROW) phase with \$5.8M of Local Contribution funds. (+\$9.8M; Total Cost: \$41.9M)
- Add \$7.3M of STBG funding to the City of Webster's NASA Road 1 Bypass construction project (MPO ID 17081/CSJ 0912-72-541) to cover design and drainage improvements, associated increased ROW needs and increased costs due to inflation. (+\$7.3M; Total Cost: \$15.3M)
- Update the Statewide Connectivity (Cat-4) and Strategic Priority (Cat-12) funding of the Texas
  Department of Transportation Houston District (TxDOT) IH-10 West widening project in Fort
  Bend County (MPO ID 18402/CSJ 0271-05-049) to match the approved funding in the 2022
  Unified Transportation Program. (+\$24.0M; Total Cost: \$78.0M)
- Delay the TxDOT Houston District FM 2920 Intelligent Transportation System (ITS) installation project (MPO ID 17045/CSJ 2941-02-054), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2023 to FY 2025 to coordinate construction letting with FM 2920 project CSJ 2941-02-056. (Total Cost: \$1.4M)
- Delay the TxDOT Houston District SH 288 ITS installation project (MPO ID 17090/CSJ 0598-02-120), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2024 to FY 2026 to allow for bridges on the corridor to be completed first. (Total Cost: \$8.0M)

- Delay the TxDOT Houston District SS 10 ITS installation project (MPO ID 17100/CSJ 0187-05-061), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2024 to FY 2026 to allow TxDOT to balance multiple funding category construction lettings under fiscal constraints. (Total Cost: \$4.5M)
- Delay the TxDOT Houston District SH 36 ITS installation project (MPO ID 18404/CSJ 0187-05-062), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2024 to FY 2026 to allow TxDOT to balance multiple funding category construction lettings under fiscal constraints. (Total Cost: \$9.9M)
- Delay the TxDOT Houston District US 290 ITS installation project (MPO ID 18522/CSJ 0114-11-090), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2024 to FY 2025 to allow completion of Computerized Transportation Management System projects on the corridor. (Total Cost: \$11.2M)
- Delay the TxDOT Houston District SH 6 ITS installation project (MPO ID 18523/CSJ 0050-04-029), funded with CMAQ, from FY 2024 to FY 2025 to allow completion of Computerized Transportation Management System projects on the US 290 corridor. (Total Cost: \$5.5M)
- Delay the City of Houston Fondren Road reconstruction project (MPO ID 17093/CSJ 0912-72-381), funded with STBG, from FY 2023 to FY 2024. It was inadvertently advanced to FY 2023 during the 2023 TIP development. (Total Cost: \$25.5M)
- Split the City of Houston Antoine Drive reconstruction and widening project (MPO ID 18034/CSJ 0912-72-615) into two sections, creating (MPO ID 18879/0912-72-687) to assist with environmental documents, PS&E packages and construction lettings. Federal STBG funding will remain the same in the corridor. An additional \$16.5M of Local Contribution will be programmed. (+\$16.5M; Total Cost: \$115.2M)
- Program \$4.2M of District Discretionary federal/state funds for the TxDOT Houston District IH 610 direct connector ramp construction project at IH 10/US 90 (MPO ID 18876/CSJ 0271-15-099) to relieve an identified bottleneck on the corridor. (+\$4.2M; Total Cost: \$4.2M)
- Program the Greater Southeast Management District's Federal Transit Administration Section 5304, Areas of Persistent Poverty, discretionary grant (MPO ID 18877/CSJ NA) in FY 2023 of the TIP. (+\$314K; Total Cost: \$314K)
- Program The Woodlands Township's Federal Transit Administration Section 5307, American Rescue Plan Act (ARPA) grant (MPO ID 18878/CSJ NA) in FY 2023 of the TIP. (+\$400K; Total Cost: \$400K)

## ITEM 7. PERFORMANCE MEASURES AND THE APPROVAL OF RESOLUTION 2022-35, KAREN OWEN, H-GAC

Ms. Karen Owen made presentation on Performance Measures. A performance-based transportation planning process is federal requirement in the development of the Transportation Improvement Program (TIP) and the Regional Transportation Plan (RTP). Ms. Owen provided the Council with a detailed overview of specific targets for 2022 which included Annual Cost of Congestion, Travel Reliability, Peak Hour Excessive Delay, Non-Single Occupancy Vehicle Work Trips, Congestion Mitigation Air Quality and Congestion Mitigation Air Quality-Future targets. Ms. Owen also highlighted some of the project types and strategies that are ongoing.

Ms. Owen requested TPC approval of Resolution No. 2022-35. A motion was made by 1<sup>st</sup> Vice Chair Justin Beckendorff and seconded by Eliza Paul. The Council voted and approved Resolution No. 2022-35.

Ms. Kim let the Council know that currently, the UPWP stated staff will "Maintain and purchase bike and pedestrian counters to meet national best practice for data collection of a region of H-GAC size". Therefore, the new verbiage would be as state "Maintain, purchase, and install bike and pedestrian counters to meet national best practice for data collection of a region of H-GAC size".

Ms. Kim asked for TPC approval of UPWP Resolution No. 23/24-5. A motion was made by Council Member Larry Millican and seconded by 1<sup>st</sup> Chair Justin Beckendorff. The Council voted and approved UPWP Resolution No. 23/24-5.

Mr. Adam Beckom, H-GAC, updated the Council on the proposed Cost Overrun Policy in effort to provide some guidance to local project sponsors, staff has identified some parameters for considering cost overruns at an 80/20 funding share as well as the 50/50 funding share.

#### D. Update of Safe Streets and Roads for All (SS4A)

Ms. Allie Isbell, H-GAC, gave an update on Safe Streets and Roads for all. H-GAC submitted an application for an Action Plan grant on behalf of the region. She described the joint applicants and partner included in the application. The decision will be made in early 2023

#### E. Summary of Transportation Planning Activities

Mr. Craig Raborn gave an update on Transportation Planning Activities. Information was provided to the TPC in the meeting packet.

#### F. H-GAC Board of Directors Report

Mr. Craig Raborn presented information on transportation items on the H-GAC Board of Directors meeting on September 20, 2022. Information was provided to the TPC in the meeting packet.

#### G. Project Selection Process

Mr. Vishu Lingala, H-GAC, updated the Council on the Project Selection Process. Mr. Lingala let the Council know that H-GAC staff sent out a request of Statements of Interest and received 585 projects at a cost of \$47.9B. Mr. Lingala described the projects by project types and described the project selection process goals. TIP Subcommittee discussion on progress and process is ongoing and a working group meeting is scheduled for Monday, September 26, 2022 at 3:30 p.m.
