- 1. Call to Order
 - a. Chairman Morad Kabiri calls for quorum at 1:32 PM and conducts roll call to ensure a quorum.
 - b. Chairman Morad Kabiri confirms there is a quorum.
- 2. Acceptance of Minutes from December 21, 2022 Meeting
 - a. Chairman Morad Kabiri asks for motion to approve
 - b. Ken Fickes motions to approve, Perri D'Armond seconds.
 - c. Motion passes unanimously

- 3. 2045 RTP Update (Mike Burns)
 - a. Phase 2 Public Outreach Recap
 - i. Mike reiterates what was presented to the subcommittee last month, which includes a recap of the phase 2 outreach. This outreach phase had 178 total participants. Staff heard safety was a priority, mobility options were split based on Beltway 8, congestion was a dominant concern, and proximity was appealing. Most participants in phase 2 did not participate in phase 1 outreach. Most were satisfied with the Visioning Outreach. The phase 2 meetings revolved around polling question and responses.
 - ii. Chairman Morad Kabiri states a question from that chat that asks if any responses were from RTP Subcommittee members.
 - 1. He said yes, from members that attended. Our public outreach is open to creative suggestions on how to better engage the community.
 - 2. No other comments
 - b. Draft, Vision, Goals, Strategies, and Investment Categories
 - Mike reveals edits to the goals and performance measures of the RTP vision. He
 also reveals edits to investment categories, specifically freight. He mentions that
 these edits are already at the TAC level. Mike discusses the summarization of
 project scoring via investment category.
 - 1. No comments
 - c. Phase 3 Outreach Timeline
 - i. Currently refining RTP Outreach and Conformity schedule. Modeling and mapping work is ongoing. There will be a preview at TAC and TPC in February. We will have notifications to publicize the public review process next month. Staff will shoot for over a month of notification. The public review will start on March 15 and will conclude on April 17th. Public meeting is tentatively scheduled for March 21st. Staff will coordinate with advocacy groups, travel demand agencies, and other stakeholders to present on the RTP participation opportunities. This phase will lean more heavily on the virtual participation. Our goal is to drive the audience to the website to provide comments. We are also trying to have the RTP approved at the same TPC meeting as air quality conformity.






Current Transportation System – Roadways

 - Condition of Pavement and Bridges





 - \$7.5 billion METRONext Moving Forward Plan





Current Transportation System – Ferry Operations

Existing Network

- Galveston Ferry and Lynchburg Ferry
- Galveston Ferry serves 5 million passengers and 1.5 million vehicles annually
- Lynchburg Ferry serves 400,000 passengers and 200,000 vehicles annually

Challenges and Opportunities

- Galveston Ferry operates with State Highway funds
- Lynchburg Ferry operates with HCTRA funds
- Terminal improvements and ferry replacement projects are anticipated at both locations




Corridor-based and Subregional -**Investment Categories**


Planning Activities – Safety



- Update the Regional Safety Action Plan
 - Realize the region's Vision Zero policy
 - Support transportation investments that strive to reduce the region's traffic fatalities to zero by 2050.
- Utilize a "Safe System Approach"
 - Design and implement facilities that safely accommodate all modes and reduce risk and severity of injuries.
- Coordinate with region's public safety officials
 - Ensure "Safe System Approach" principles and strategies are utilized.

Planning Activities – Reliability

- Develop a Congestion Management Plan
 - Reduce vehicle miles traveled in the region
 - Improve options to access jobs
 - Prioritize projects and programs that:
 - Reduce congestion
 - Increase access to jobs in congested areas



Planning Activities – Resiliency



- Develop a Regional Resiliency Improvement Plan
- Incorporate Resilience and Durability to Extreme Weather Pilot
 Program findings into H-GAC processes
- Form a Transportation Resiliency Working Group to develop a multi-year strategy
- Actively participate in and contribute to the Texas MPO
 Resiliency Working Group



Planning Activities – Equity



- Develop, adopt, and implement a Regional Equity Policy
- Ensure regional investments align with identified needs in all local communities
- Evaluate alternative investment scenarios as part of the transportation planning process





Planning Activities – Livability



- Develop a Regional Complete Streets Prioritization Plan
 - Projects that Improve safety, mobility, accessibility of a street
- Identify priority Transit Centers and Park and Ride locations for Transit-Oriented Development
- Investment in the High-Growth Areas of the region.



Planning Activities – Analytics



- Utilize a <u>performance-based and data-informed</u> approach
- Utilized best-practices in <u>Scenario Planning</u> to:
 - Evaluate various land use development scenarios
 - Evaluate various transportation investment scenarios



Planning Activities – Public Outreach



- Identify best practices for both virtual and in-person public participation.
- Identify methods of outreach to provide better awareness and opportunities in vulnerable populations.



Planning Activities – Emerging Technologies



- Electric Vehicle Infrastructure
 - Install DC Fast Charge stations:
 - Along Alternative Fuel Corridors
 - At or near county seats
 - Within large urban areas
 - Collect data from the network to assess usage and identify trends for future development



Planning Activities – Emerging Technologies



- Autonomous and Connected Vehicles
 - Develop and promote a strategic plan
 - Educate public officials and public about Connected and AV benefits
 - Identify opportunities for:
 - Early deployment of Connected and Automated Vehicles
 - Reducing operating costs
 - Integrated multimodal transit system and pilot programs
 - Public/private partnerships
