4. Safety Briefing – Open Discussion

Dexter Handy (Greater Houston Coalition for Complete Streets, Citizens' Transportation Coalition) led the safety briefing discussion with a history of the Lisa Torry Smith Act. The Lisa Torry Smith act, passed in 2021, makes it a criminal offense for drivers to hit pedestrians and bicyclists in the crosswalk. He shared recent statistics on pedestrians and bicyclists killed on Houston streets, recommendations for educating the public to spread awareness of the Act, and pedestrian infrastructure recommendations for planners and engineers on the subcommittee.

5. Biketober 2024 Recap & Mapping Tool Demo

Emanuel Andrews (H-GAC) and Laura Cisneros (Love to Ride) presented ridership information and demographic data from Bike The Gulf's Biketober campaign. The region saw increases in miles and trips, and decreases in registered riders, showing riders were taking longer trips. This year was also the first year there were more transportation trips than non-transportation trips.

Will Caiger (Love to Ride) gave a demonstration of Love to Ride's mapping tool, which produces data on rider comfort and infrastructure issues by incorporating rider feedback on trips. Data is available to users via a heat-map, and more specific data can be made available to local governments and agencies.

6. Local Active Transportation Plans Update

Qun Zhao (H-GAC) presented updates for three local active transportation plans:

The City of Friendswood Trails Master Plan Study is a 12-month study to identify where multimodal trails are most needed within the city limits, provide policy and guidance to develop a community-wide trail network, enhance recreational opportunities, and provide and alternative transportation system. A consultant was selected for the study, and they are finalizing the scope of work with H-GAC. The study is expected to start in February 2025. The City of Friendswood is the local sponsor.

The Buffalo Bayou East Design Concept Study is a 12-month study focusing on improving bike and ped safety and near the bayou, improving community connectivity to the bayou, and developing an active transit-oriented plan centered on the Fifth Ward/Denver Harbor Transit Center. The study kicked off in October 2024. The first steering committee meeting is scheduled for January 29; the first stakeholder group meeting and first round of public engagement are both scheduled for February 2025. The final report will be published October 2025. Buffalo Bayou Partnership is the local sponsor.

The Memorial Drive Bicycle and Pedestrian Study is a 12-month study to establish recommendations for improved multimodal infrastructure in the Energy Corridor District, focused on two primary corridors: Memorial Drive (SH 6 to N Eldridge Pkwy) and Grisby Rd (SH 6 to Westlake Park Blvd). The first steering committee meeting and first public meeting are both scheduled for February 2025. Energy Corridor District is the local sponsor.

7. Harris County Precinct 4 Activities Update

Jessica Cohen (Harris County) presented updates on Harris County Precinct 4's active transportation projects. Since taking office two years ago, Commissioner Briones' priorities have been sidewalks, community centers, and parks/trails.

Commissioner Briones spent \$21M last year on her sidewalks program, reducing or eliminating sidewalk gaps in 35 locations, with an average turnaround of 8-weeks from gap identification to construction completion.

Precinct 4's Places for People Call for Projects is held every June and allows for local partnerships for shovel ready projects. 2023's call led to \$83M in partnership contributions and \$88M invested by Harris County Precinct 4. 2024's call led to \$31.1M in partnership contributions and \$17.7M invested by Precinct 4.

Precinct 4 is in a partnership with HCTRA for HCTRA's Tollways to Trailways program. Program goals within Precinct 4's boundaries are to reconnect communities across the Westpark Tollway and to create a school district area near Cook Rd, working with ISDs to better connect residential communities to the seven schools in their area.

8. Planned Ped/Bike Activities in the Region

TIRZ 5 is opening construction bids for Phase II Shephard/Durham (15th St to IH-10). Construction should start near the end of the quarter.

Bike the Woodlands Coalition is holding quarterly bike recycling drives and working with Recycled Cycles of Texas to repair bikes to distribute them to people in need. Last week 415 bicycles were collected. Bike the Woodlands is connecting to local organizations like Bike for Refugees, Compassion United, and local school staffs for assistance in distribution.

Opening construction bids for phase II Shephard/Durham (TIRZ5); 15th to IH-10, construction should start near the end of the quarter.

H-GAC has two studies coming up where Ped/Bike Subcommittee engagement is critical: this summer the 2050 Regional Transportation Plan and Regional Active Transportation Plan engagement is launching.

Houston Parks Board is opening trail segments in Sharpstown and Spring Branch this year. They're also working on multiple studies to incorporate community in the design process. The PCT 4 Alief Trail and Spring Branch Trail are two projects with such studies.

TIRZ 5's Transportation Alternatives grant study is kicking off in March/April. The study will explore transportation alternatives in and around the TIRZ boundaries and the Spring Street Trail.

Greater Northside Management District has a Design Concept Review (DCR) on Jensen Dr (I-69 to Kelly). The study will look at planning and infrastructure improvements for the corridor. There's an upcoming stakeholder meeting January 27, and a public meeting 2/12. The Quitman Street project started construction late last year.

TxDOT opened its Transportation Alternatives set-aside program call for projects January 3. Preliminary applications are due February 21.

Safety Briefing: Beyond Blame (Strong Towns Report)



Strong Towns developed an approach for discovering the causes of crashes beyond individual blame.

- Crash Analysis Studio model brings together experts and community members to analyze deadly crashes to find systemic causes.
- Studios have been held in 22 cities so far (including Amarillo and San Antonio).
- Report found **5 universal contributing factors** and gave **6** recommendations for local leaders.



Safety Briefing: Beyond Blame (Strong Towns Report)



Contributing Factors:

- High-speed road design in urban areas
- Inadequate design for walkers and bicyclists
- Dangerous intersection design
- Visibility and lighting issues
- Deviation from designer intent

Recommendations:

- Make safety a core organizational responsibility
- Establish a Crash Response Team
- Establish a Crash Analysis Studio
- Use temporary traffic control devices to respond quickly
- Update local street standards to prioritize safety
- Conduct bike and walk audits for all projects









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Who are the MPO staff?

PEDESTRIAN-BICYCLIST SUBCOMMITTEE

<u>Purpose</u>

The Pedestrian-Bicyclist Subcommittee's purpose is to accomplishing the following tasks: review and approve the Active Transportation Plan, guide and review the FHWA Connectivity Measures Pilot, guide the Regional Safety Campaign, guide reinvigoration of counter program, guide the creation of and review the ATP Toolbox, and develop naming conventions for sidewalk layer.

Meeting Schedule

Meetings are held quarterly, or more frequently as needed.

<u>Membership</u>

Committee members are stakeholders involved with pedestrian and bicyclist issues. This shall include advocacy, safety, user groups, local, county representatives of economic development, developers or management districts, state agencies, engineers, land use planners, community organizations, and interested citizens. A maximum of twenty-two (22) voting members shall comprise the Subcommittee, which shall include any TAC representative.



Ped/Bike Subcommittee Bylaws

- 22 voting members
 - 44 member roster
- Members serve two-year terms
- 1 Chair and 1 Vice-Chair
- 50% attendance for quorum
- Primary members vote when present
 - Alternate members vote only when primary is <u>not</u> present
 - Primary and alternate members coordinate to ensure one member attend meeting



GIS Network Update Work Group

Purpose: update the regional ped/bike networks in GIS for both technical and public users.

Goals:

- Develop a standardized GIS attribute table and nomenclature.
- Develop a standardized qualitative/comfort/functional use criteria for ped/bike infrastructure.
- Develop a standardized schedule for routine updates.



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Progress:

- Completed Bike Network typology definitions Completed attributes for existing/short-term bike projects Receiving bike network updates from local jurisdictions

Work Plan:

- Update the sidewalk network layer
- Develop a standardized qualitative/comfort/functional use criteria for ped/bike infrastructure
- Create a reasonable update schedule





Travel Demand Forecast Work Group

Purpose: develop a new (or modify an existing) demand forecast model that will accurately project active transportation travel.

Goals:

- Research best practices.
- Compile data that will eventually feed into the model (bike/ped network GIS layer, household surveys, O/D surveys, etc.).
- Develop list of surveys needed, focusing on active transportation.



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Travel Demand Forecast Work Group

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Transportation Alternatives Set-Aside Program

- The Bipartisan Infrastructure Law (BIL) allocates a percentage of Surface Transportation Block Grant dollars for transportation alternatives (23 U.S.C. §133(h))
 - Ped/Bike facilities
 - **Recreational trails**
 - Safe Routes to School
- MPOs with a population over 200,000 implement their own program with a competitive project selection process (43 TAC §11.403)
 H-GAC: \$60M available for TASA this cycle

Creating a regional Safe Routes to School (SRTS) program is identified in the goals of H-GAC's Unified Planning Work Program (UPWP)

- Conduct a literature review and best practices study of SRTS, including recommendations for the MPO's role in moving SRTS forward in the region.
- Provide planning support for implementation of SRTS best practices in the region.
- Provide technical support for regional, local area, corridor, and sitespecific SRTS plans

Literature Review

Literature review covered the 23 other Texas MPOs and 4 out of state to research best practices in implementing SRTS at the regional level. Three recommendations came from the review:

- Separate SRTS planning projects from TA to its own call for projects.

- Inventory existing SRTS programs in the area and stakeholder interest in starting more.


