

Houston-Galveston Area Council Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery Program Method of Distribution Reallocation Amendment

Four years ago, in 2018, the Houston-Galveston Area Council Board of Directors approved a Method of Distribution for \$129 Million in Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery funds for local infrastructure projects in the H-GAC region.

The Board-approved 2018 Hurricane Harvey Community Development Block Grant - Disaster Recovery Method of Distribution of Funds included a reallocation process for any of the allocated funds that were declined or de-obligated.

Ten entities have unused/unspent funds totaling \$2,305,505.00 available to reallocate, as noted in the table below. H-GAC is seeking public comment on the amended Method of Distribution.

The reallocation process entails:

- 1. Any declined or de-obligated funds are first offered to the county in which the initial recipient was located.
- 2. If the counties do not accept the funds, they would then be offered to a set of specific local governments established by the Board.

Two key points to keep in mind:

- This MOD and amendment process are separate from the 2022 Community Development Block Grant Mitigation (CDBG-MIT) MOD approved by the Texas General Land Office in August.
- The Texas General Land Office did not include Harris County and the City of Houston in the 2018 MOD or reallocation process as they each received separate direct allocations.

Meeting Minutes

- 1. The meeting convened at 5:30 pm with Justin Bower as main speaker and co-host, Andrea Tantillo as host, Cheryl Mergo as co-host, Pramod Sambidi as co-host and Sara Hart as co-host.
- 2. <u>Participants:</u> The meeting a total of 53 participants, including staff and interpreters, attended.
- 3. Introduced by Justin Bower, Andrea Tantillo proceeded to go over housekeeping rules and introduced the following available interpreters:

- 4. Agenda items were presented by Justin Bower. His presentation was 25 minutes long and touched on the following items:

 - i. <u>Sub-Item 1:</u> History and Background
 - ii. Sub-Item 2: Community Development Block Grant Disaster Recovery Program
 - iii. <u>Sub-Item 3:</u> Method of Distribution and Reallocation Process
 - b. Item 2: Discussion of the Houston-Galveston Region's Proposed Reallocation Methodology
- 5. <u>Questions and Answers:</u> Justin opened the meeting to Questions and Answers at 5:55 pm, Andrea Tantillo opened the chat. Justin Bower introduced Sara Hart who read the questions to in the chat and invited participants with raised hands to unmute and ask their questions. There were no additional questions as of 6:27 p.m., however, Justin summarized the presentation for participants who missed the beginning of the meeting. H-GAC staff and interpreters remained online until the posted end time for the meeting at 7:30 p.m.



Summary of questions and comments:

Kristi Hadnot – Are there any other factors being used besides structure damage for the reallocation? (Damage to housing units was measured and categorized to support the original Method of Distribution. This formula is available on our website.)

Kristi Hadnot – Can these funds be used for planning activities associated with infrastructure improvements? (*Justin will confirm and get back to her with an answer either during this meeting or offline later*)

Barbara McIntyre – Liberty County Long Term Recovery Group – Is this something we can apply for to repair housing. (*This would have to go through your county or local government. These specific funds are specifically aimed at local infrastructure.*)

Sylvester Reeder - Had his question answered as part of the previous question

Peggy Zahler – When do you envision this going to the board, and what would be an anticipated time for entities to begin discussions with GLO? (*We will take it to board in January, then resubmit to GLO for review and approval. The timing will depend on GLO's review process, and then will work directly with local governments.*)

Peggy Zahler – Are there any specific costs that won't be allowed that you know of? (Justin offered to have a conversation offline. Peggy said she'd review the MOD online.)

Gwenyth Teves – If counties in the damage hierarchy decline funds, will it roll back to the cities in that county? (*That's some feedback we can take through this process.*)

Jimmy Henry – Can this be spent on infrastructure (*This reallocation is specifically for local infrastructure.*)

Titilayo Smith – Has already contacted the Texas City Public Works Director, Mayor and Emergency Manager to consider whether the City has any projects that may qualify for these types of funds and may have comments after reviewing the website.

The distribution should be based on, but not limited to, unmet need tied back to Hurricane Harvey damages.



Low- and Moderate-Income Requirement

Below is an explanation of how the method of distribution meets the 70 percent low- and moderate-income (LMI) requirement for each program. This means that 70 percent of the funds must benefit areas that are 51% or more LMI persons with incomes below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI).

Per requirements of the State of Texas Plan for Disaster Recovery: Hurricane Harvey June 25, 2018, submitted to the United States Department Housing and Urban Development (HUD) by the Texas General Land Office (GLO), at least 70% of the program funds will benefit low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons. All entities will be required to follow established rules and regulations related to the funding received.

Citizen Participation

Below is a description addressing how the COG complied with their Citizen Participation Plan regarding citizen and nongovernmental organization outreach, and any additional efforts exceeding GLO minimum public participation requirements: Beyond the minimum requirements that the GLO has outlined in the contract, H-GAC implemented the additional tactics listed below to increase overall public participation:

- Distributed electronic flyers and asked community organizations to share information with their audiences
 - H-GAC sent a one-page flyer that contains all the information about the meetings to identified stakeholders so they could either forward the information to their membership or print off the material to post on a bulletin board or high-traffic area at their location.
- Purchased legal ads in English, Spanish, Vietnamese, and Mandarin newspapers across the region.
- Sent direct emails to identified stakeholders (i.e., elected officials and staff, fair housing groups, long term recovery groups etc.)
 - In addition to direct emails to elected officials and staff representing jurisdictions across the 13-county region, H-GAC also invited the following groups to attend the public planning meeting on November 9 to provide feedback and ask questions, to attend the public hearing on December 6, and to provide comment in writing or verbally. State and Federal Elected Officials, Office of Emergency Management Staff, Regional Flood Management Committee Members, and Soil and Water Conservation staff.
 - To gain additional perspective on fair housing and civil rights issues in the region, H-GAC also invited the following groups to attend the public planning meeting on November 9 to provide feedback and ask questions, to attend the public hearing on December 6, and to provide comment in writing or verbally. Community Development Directors and Staff, Faith-based Organizations, Neighborhood and Community Improvement Organizations. Long-Term Recovery Groups, Housing Authorities, Housing Advocacy Groups, Homeless Services Organizations, Food Banks, County Health Districts, and other non-profit organizations, including MMHR, NAACP, United Way, Habitat for Humanity, Area Agency on Aging, Meals on Wheels, and LULAC.
- Promoted the public planning meeting, public hearing, and comment period through H-GAC's external newsletters, the Community and Environmental Planning Update and the Regional Focus.
- Promoted the public planning meeting, public hearing, and comment period by posting to community calendars and newsletters.
- Promoted the public planning meeting, public hearing, and comment period via social media posts (i.e., Facebook, LinkedIn, Instagram, and Twitter).

The public planning meeting was held online and the public hearing will held online and in person so participants can safely and easily participate. H-GAC hosted the public planning meeting on the Zoom platform and will host hosted the public hearing at its offices in Houston and via the Zoom platform to allow participants to participate in person or to join via desktop, mobile phone, or dial-in should they have limited internet connectivity.

All public outreach efforts attempt to solicit as much feedback as possible by making meeting times and locations accessible and by working with organizations that provide public-focused services.

Additionally, H-GAC is providing multiple methods in which stakeholders can provide feedback including not only verbally and in chat at public meetings, but also via email, voicemail, and web portal until 5 p.m. December 15, 2022.

Recognizing that the 13-county region is diverse, and using current census data, H-GAC provided or will provide Spanish, Vietnamese, and Mandarin interpreters at all public meetings and hearings so participants can actively listen, ask questions, or engage in dialogue with H-GAC staff. American Sign Language interpreters were also present throughout an public planning meeting on November 9 and will be present at the public hearing on December 6. The availability of interpreters was advertised in all outreach materials. Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Statement

All subrecipients will certify that they will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH") in their grant agreements, and will receive GLO training and technical assistance in meeting their AFFH obligations. Additionally, all project applications will undergo AFFH review by GLO before approval of projects. Such review will include assessment of a proposed project's area demography, socioeconomic characteristics, housing configuration and needs, educational, transportation, and health care opportunities, environmental hazards or concerns, and all other factors material to the AFFH determination. Applications should show that projects are likely to lessen area racial, ethnic, and low-income concentrations, and/or promote affordable housing in low-poverty, nonminority areas in response to natural hazard related impacts.
