REGIONAL JUVENILE SERVICES PROJECT - FISCAL YEAR 2022

Background

There is an increasing need for counties to address mental health issues of youth who have been referred to their Juvenile Probation Departments. This topic is listed as a need in county Community Plans and is a priority in the Commissioners Courts of our region. Of particular concern are juveniles in need of diagnosis and therapy. Because this is a region-wide need, the H-GAC Criminal Justice Program is applying for funds that would enable counties to increase the availability of diagnostic and counseling services for these individuals. Over the past three years, the Juvenile Mental Health program provided more than 750 evaluations and 1,800 hours of counseling to young people across the region suffering from behavioral and psychological issues.

Current Situation

The fiscal year 2021 project is providing counseling and mental health services for juveniles in the ten counties currently contracting with the Houston-Galveston Area Council. Surveys are being conducted to determine exact needs in the juvenile counseling/mental health area among the thirteen Juvenile Probation Departments in the region. Once identified, \$105,000 in pass-through funds will be made available to the juvenile probation departments to provide diagnostic services and/or professional therapy if needed:

REGIONAL HOMELAND SECURITY PLANNING INITIATIVE

Background

This project will continue planning activities to support the 13-county H-GAC region. H-GAC Public Safety Planners will coordinate the development of the Regional Homeland Security Implementation Plan; work with the Houston Urban Area Security Initiative; coordinate the Regional Homeland Security Coordinating Council / Homeland Security Advisory Committee; represent the region as part of statewide homeland security/emergency management work groups; and conduct regional and local homeland security and emergency management catastrophic planning. In addition, H-GAC Public Safety staff will assist jurisdictions with adopting/revising the Gulf Coast State Planning Regional Mutual Aid Agreement. In addition, the project will provide H-GAC Public Safety Planners the training, and associated travel, required to perform the activities in accordance with best practices.

Current Situation

H-GAC Public Safety staff assists jurisdictions with catastrophic planning including identifying capability gaps, assisting jurisdictions with homeland security/emergency management planning; developing regional preparedness strategies, and ensuring the region is able to prevent, respond, and recover from all-hazards, including acts of terrorism.

CHILD PASSENGER - BICYCLE SAFETY EDUCATION & OUTREACH

Background

Since March 2010, H-GAC has contracted with Texas Children's Hospital Center for Childhood Injury Prevention and its Safe Kids[®] Coalition to expand its child passenger and bicycle safety outreach assistance. The Safe Kids Coalition is a key provider of education and assistance in the region for proper child safety system installation.

Through this partnership, Safe Kids has trained 148 child passenger safety specialists, including four Spanish-speaking specialists; distributed 25,000 bike helmets to economically-disadvantaged children; held several bike rodeos for child bicycle safety; provided child safety materials to over 600,000 people; and provided 6,400 child seats to economically-disadvantaged families in the region.

Current Situation

The current contract with Texas Children's Hospital Center includes an amount of \$160,000 and the contract ends on August 31, 2021. H-GAC is requesting to increase the contract by \$50,000 for a total contract amount not to exceed \$210,000. Upon this approval, the contract will be extended through July 31, 2022 along with the addition of funding amount.

TEENS IN THE DRIVER SEAT PROGRAM

Background

Since November 2009, H-GAC has contracted with the Texas A&M Transportation Institute to provide traffic safety outreach assistance through its Teens in the Driver Seat program. The program is a unique approach to safety outreach, working with teens and young adults to provide them the information and tools to educate their fellow students about traffic safety.

The program currently has 50 chapters or partnerships in the region, include 30 high school chapters and 20 junior high school chapters. The program is also working to establish chapters at colleges.

Current Situation

The Teens in the Driver Seat program is an important part of the regional safety campaign. Due to the significance of addressing driver safety early and often with young drivers, it is critical to ensure that this information continues in junior high schools, high schools, and now colleges in the region.

The current contract with Texas A&M Transportation Institute includes an amount of \$190,000 and the contract ends on August 31, 2021. H-GAC is requesting authorization to increase the contract by \$65,000 for a total contract amount of \$255,000. Upon this approval, the contract will be extended through July 31, 2022 along with the additional funding amount.

TOTAL MAXIMUM DAILY LOAD PROJECTS

Background

Houston-Galveston Area Council has contracted with the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality since 2007 to support initiatives to reduce bacteria and other pollutants in area waterways through Total Maximum Daily Load projects. The scope of this agreement covers all the bayous in the Houston metropolitan area, as well as Clear Creek, Lake Houston, Armand Bayou, and other areas. Through this contract, H-GAC established the Bacteria Implementation Group, comprised of local government representatives and other stakeholders. The Bacteria Implementation Group developed a voluntary Regional Bacteria Reduction Plan, implementation of which is underway.

Current Situation

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality has proposed to amend the current contract with H-GAC to continue coordination of Regional Bacteria Reduction Plan implementation efforts and provide technical support including water quality standards, monitoring and assessment; watershed planning and management; and public participation to waterbodies within the 13-county H-GAC service region.

This amendment will take effect on the date of signing and continue through November 30, 2024.

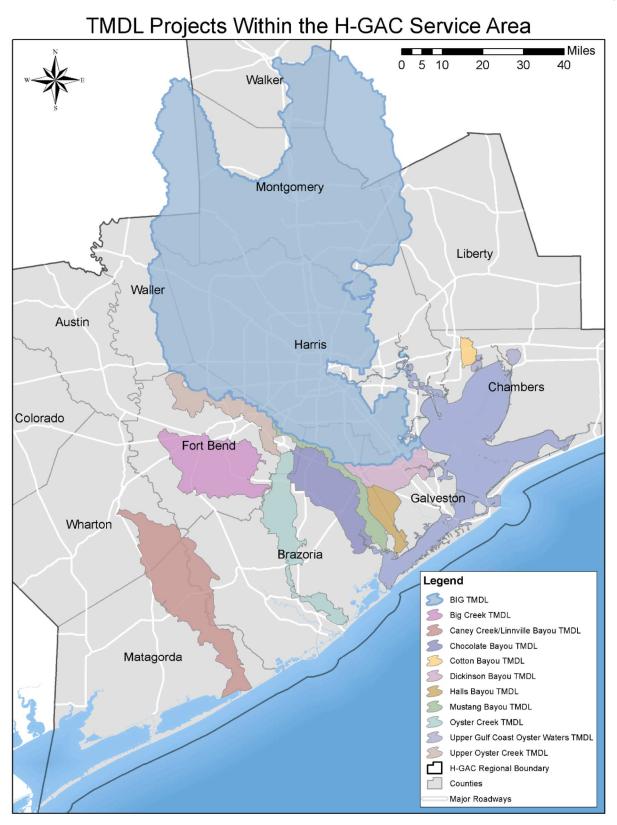

WORKFORCE FINANCIAL MONITORING CONTRACTS

Background

Through H-GAC, the Workforce Board contracts with two financial monitoring firms to review workforce system contractors' financial systems and billings - ensuring compliance with contract requirements, rules, and regulations as well as appropriateness of expenditures. Financial monitors are procured on a four-year cycle, renewable annually.

Current Situation

Our financial monitors - Weaver and Tidwell LLC and Christine Nguyen, CPA - continue to deliver exceptional service in reviewing workforce contractors. We are recommending the Board renew both for a third year.

Because of an increase in both the dollars invested in the workforce system and number of workforce contractors, we are recommending up to \$975,000 for financial monitoring activities that include:

- financial system compliance monitoring
- expenditure testing for appropriateness and allowability
- special reviews of workforce management information and financial reporting systems and risk management
- continuing education for contractors on financial topics

We will negotiate scopes of work with each contractor to ensure that total dollars in the two contracts combined would not exceed the maximum available.

WORKFORCE PAYROLL CONTRACT

Background

The Workforce Board through H-GAC contracts with ProSource Solutions Inc., a payrolling agency, to support Vocational Rehabilitation Services customers who are participating in work experience. VRS counselors stationed in local workforce system offices identify worksites and place their customers - individuals with disabilities - in part-time, subsidized jobs to help these customers gain needed work experience before entering the job market.

Current Situation

We are seeing an increase in the number of Vocational Rehabilitation Services customers placed in work experience, and consequently we have a need for additional funds for ProSource, which continues to perform satisfactorily as a payroller/employer of record for vocational rehabilitation customers.

We recommend increasing the ProSource Solutions Inc. contract to a total of \$825,000 and extending the term one month to September 30, 2021. With this contract, we expect to serve up to 300 individuals with disabilities.

Variance Analysis

The presentation of the change in fund balance by fund type is intended to highlight the effects of revenue and expenditure transactions by fund. The General Fund (GF) consists of those funds not associated with grant programs or enterprise activities. The Special Revenue Fund (SRF) consists of those funds that are restricted for a specific purpose. HGAC's grant programs are in this fund. The Enterprise Fund is used to track activities of the Cooperative Purchasing program and the Energy Purchasing Corporation. The variances of specific revenues and expenditures are explained on the second page of this report.

*** The Cooperative Purchasing program has contributed a \$474,740 increase toward the Enterprise fund balance YTD, and the Energy Purchasing Corporation is reflecting a (\$10,401) decrease to the Enterprise fund balance.

Variances:

a) We have been in contact with entities that have outstanding dues, and we anticipate payment soon.

(b) Other revenue includes the EDA loan program that has seen increased activity due to COVID related funds being made available to small businesses. These funds were not originally in H-GAC's budget and will need to be included in the mid-year revision.

(c) Federal pass-through revenue and expense in an EPA program administered by the Transportation department is off to a slow start for the year. We will review and revise the anticipated progress on this grant during the budget revision process.

(d) The travel budget was anticipating that Covid restrictions would end in 2021. We are starting to see some easing of restrictions and requests for in-person events that include in-region and out-of-region travel, so we expect that our expenses will increase later in the year.

ELDER JUSTICE PROGRAM - FISCAL YEAR 2022

Background

Elder abuse is the fastest growing crime in the United States, according to the Federal Bureau of Investigations. Rates of victimization were expected to double by 2030 even before the pandemic increased pressures on families and further isolated vulnerable seniors. As a public safety and criminal justice issue, the rising tide of elder abuse has major implications for Texas, which has the nation's third-largest senior population. Launched in fall of 2018, H-GAC's Elder Justice Program provides limited services directly to seniors who have fallen victim to crime. H-GAC concentrates on filling the #1 unmet victim need — legal advocacy and access to basic legal tools such as protective orders and power of attorney — through the work of staff attorneys as well as the recruitment and training of a new corps of pro bono attorneys and law students. The cash value of the in-kind services donated by these volunteer lawyers and law students will constitute H-GAC's local match as required under the federal Victims of Crime Act.

Current Situation

The Public Safety Program seeks authorization to apply for the continuation of its existing Victims of Crime Act grant. Victims of Crime Act funds underwrite H-GAC staff time in helping seniors who are victims of crime in seeking protection, restitution, recovery and justice. In early 2021, H-GAC entered Phase II of the Elder Justice Program which saw expansion of legal advocacy and legal representation services for victims from four counties (Fort Bend, Galveston, Harris, Montgomery) to eight counties with the addition of Chambers, Liberty, Matagorda, and Wharton counties. This Resolution seeks the Board of Directors' approval to apply for and to accept a Victims of Crime Act grant for operating funds to cover the expanded program services. If awarded, this Victims of Crime Act grant will run from October 1, 2021 through September 30, 2022.

H-GAC CENTER ON ABUSE IN LATER LIFE

Background

The Center on Abuse in Later Life grew out of H-GAC's three-year old Elder Justice Program with the goal of protecting and supporting victims by building a coordinated community response to crimes of elder abuse. When H-GAC began providing direct services to seniors recovering from crime in 2018, staff quickly realized that there was a lack of formal training for those investigating and prosecuting elder abuse, as well as those helping the victims recover. The Center for Abuse in Later Life was established to bring specialized training, national best practices and technical assistance in elder abuse to government and non-profit agencies throughout H-GAC's thirteen-county region.

Texas is experiencing an increase of elder abuse cases and the FBI forecasts that the number of elder abuse crimes will double by 2030. Increased victimization has major implications for Texas, which has the nation's third-largest senior population.

Current Situation

Violence Against Women Act funds are used to launch Multi-Disciplinary Case Review Teams (e.g. technical assistance, in-region training by national experts, a shared Regional Board of Experts). Our Multi-Disciplinary Case Review Teams are currently in three urban counties: Fort Bend, Galveston and Montgomery; and four rural counties: Chambers, Liberty, Matagorda and Wharton. H-GAC has a long-term goal of establishing Multi-Disciplinary Case Review Teams in all thirteen H-GAC counties. Trainings and case consultation are offered to criminal justice and non-profit agencies throughout H-GAC's thirteen county region to prepare responders to handle elder abuse cases. The grant renewal would run from September 1, 2021, through August 31, 2022.

LAW ENFORCEMENT TRAINING - FISCAL YEARS 2022-2023

Background

H-GAC has sponsored a regional law enforcement training program for over thirty years. The program supports local law enforcement training academies and other training providers that meet Texas Commission on Law Enforcement standards. The program averages training 2,500 officers with 90,000 contact hours per year.

Current Situation

H-GAC will request new proposals from qualified training providers for Fiscal Year 2022 – Fiscal Year 2023 for Basic Peace Officer Course, in-service, intermediate and advanced training. When preparing recommendations, staff will use results of the annual Training Needs Survey, cost per contact hour, geographic accessibility, and the number of officers to be served. Once identified, \$640,162 in pass-through funds will be made available to the awarded entities.
