Citizen and Non-Governmental Organization Outreach

The COG will encourage citizens, with particular emphasis on persons of low-to-moderate income and other vulnerable populations to submit their views regarding community development and housing needs resulting from the disaster(s) in the following ways:

The Houston-Galveston Area Council (H-GAC) plans to conduct citizen and non-governmental outreach via: a) broad announcement of Public Planning Meetings (4 total), Public Hearings (2 total), and opportunities for public comment; b) directly communicating with faith-based organizations, housing and protected classes advocacy groups, community development organizations and other non-profits prior to the release of the draft Method of Distribution; and c) conducting one invitation-only input session with regional and local advocacy groups prior to the release of the draft Method of Distribution.

- a) H-GAC will implement a media campaign using local English and non-English newspapers to inform and invite the public to four Public Planning Meetings and two Public Hearings. H-GAC will post notices of these meetings in relevant Papers of General Circulation for all 12 eligible counties and identified non-English newspapers, as well as on the H-GAC, General Land Office, and the Secretary of State websites. H-GAC will accept written comments on the draft Method of Distribution beginning at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 21, 2018 through 4:00 p.m. Friday, July 6, 2018. A hard-copy of the draft Method of Distribution will be made available for public inspection and comment at the H-GAC reception area at 3555 Timmons, Suite 120, Houston, TX 77027 throughout the comment period. H-GAC will also accept public comments on the draft Method of Distribution via the project website during the same timeframe.

H-GAC will conduct five meetings open to the public on the draft Method of Distribution, four Public Planning Meetings to inform the draft and two Public Hearings during the public comment period:

- b) H-GAC will communicate with faith-based organizations, housing and protected classes advocacy groups, community development organizations and other non-profits. A detailed spreadsheet labeled “Public Participation Plan Database” is attached. Direct contact methods may include email and phone. Direct communication will include distributing summary documents explaining the Method of Distribution process, notices of Public Planning Meetings (4 total), Public Hearings (2 total), and processes for providing public comments. H-GAC will encourage faith-based organizations, housing and protected classes advocacy groups, community development organizations and other non-profits to broadly disseminate the information via announcements at gatherings and meetings, newsletters, email lists and bulletin board postings.
- c) In addition to the required Public Planning Meetings and Public Hearings outlined under item (a) on pages 1 and 2, **H-GAC will conduct one invitation-only input session with regional and local advocacy groups on Wednesday, June 6, 2018 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the Houston-Galveston Area Council Offices, 3555 Timmons Lane, Houston, TX, 77027.** The input session will be held prior to the release of the draft Method of Distribution for public comment with regional and local housing advocacy groups and other organizations representing protected classes of individuals. H-GAC will seek input regarding the Method of Distribution at the input session.
- d) H-GAC will submit all required documentation to the GLO as verification that the activities outlined in this plan were carried out.

In addition to the stakeholders identified in item (b) on page 2, H-GAC will communicate with county and city elected officials, city administrators, community development departments and housing authorities, local health and human services offices, local mental health and MHMR offices, Community Development Corporations and Community Housing Development Organization representatives from the Local Union of Latin American Citizens (LULAC), Mexican American Legal Defense and Education Fund (MALDEF) the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), Houston Hispanic Chamber of Commerce, Tri-County Black Chamber of Commerce, and the Asian Chamber of Commerce and Disability Policy Consortium via e-mail with information concerning the date, time, location and topics to be covered at Public Planning Meetings (4 total) and Public Hearings (2) total.

A detailed spreadsheet identifying these stakeholders, labeled "Public Participation Plan Database," is attached. A schedule of all draft Method of Distribution public and invitation-only meetings is also attached.

The following organizations interested in fair housing issues and representing protected classes of individuals will be contacted to gain additional perspective on fair housing and civil rights issues in the region, and how the people they represent were affected by the disaster(s). Approaches beyond simple written notification of public hearings are required and detailed below:

In addition to the required Public Planning Meetings and Public Hearings outlined under item (a) on page 1, H-GAC will conduct one invitation-only input session with regional and local advocacy groups on Wednesday, June 6, 2018 from 2:00 to 4:00 p.m. at the Houston-Galveston Area Council Offices, 3555 Timmons Lane, Houston, TX, 77027.

The input session will be held prior to the release of the draft Method of Distribution for public comment with regional and local housing advocacy groups and other organizations representing protected classes of individuals. H-GAC will seek to gain additional perspective on fair housing and civil rights issues in the region, as well as receive input regarding the draft Method of Distribution at the input session.

A detailed spreadsheet identifying these stakeholders, labeled "Public Participation Plan Database," is attached. A schedule of all draft Method of Distribution public and invitation-only meetings is also attached.

The COG acknowledges that language differences may play a role in effectively reaching non-English speaking residents. The COG will address these potential barriers by providing notification efforts as follows:

H-GAC will purchase public notice ads in Newspapers of General Circulation in Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Waller, Walker, and Wharton counties. Additional notices will be placed in Spanish and Vietnamese language papers.

Meeting announcements will be forwarded to other regional media to be used at their discretion. H-GAC will also forward meeting notices, in English, Spanish and Vietnamese, to counties and cities within the region for bulletin board posting, publication on their websites or in their newsletters or shared with residents through automatic information sharing or through broadcast on municipal television stations. H-GAC will employ sign language translators and Spanish and Vietnamese interpreters at Public Planning Meetings (4 total) and Public Hearings (2 total).

- Opportunities for submitting public comment on the draft Method of Distribution.

The Public Planning Meetings (4 total) and Public Hearings (2 total) will be conducted in English; however, Spanish, Vietnamese and sign language interpreters will be available.

Efforts Exceeding Minimum Participation Requirements

The GLO has encouraged the COG to seek public participation when developing the method of distribution. In pursuit of this goal, the COG held additional meetings and took other additional actions as follows:

As outlined on page 1, H-GAC will conduct five meetings open to the public on the draft Method of Distribution, four Public Planning Meetings to inform the draft and two Public Hearings during the public comment period in five different counties to better accommodate regional populations and encourage attendance. One invitation-only input session with regional and local advocacy groups will also occur to better inform the draft Method of Distribution.

In addition, H-GAC will discuss the Method of Distribution at monthly H-GAC Board of Directors meetings and provide for public comment. H-GAC will also send out a letter to federal and state elected officials representing constituents in the project area, notifying them of the project, upcoming Public Planning Meetings (4 total) and Public Hearings (2 total), and other pertinent project information.

Hurricane Harvey Community Development Block Grant Disaster Funds

The Houston-Galveston Area Council is seeking input regarding the allocation of Community Development Block Grant (CDBG) Disaster Recovery funding to counties and local jurisdictions for buyout/acquisition and infrastructure projects associated with Hurricane Harvey.

The Texas General Land Office allocated \$111 million of recovery funds to the H-GAC region for only a local buyout/acquisition program and \$130 million for local infrastructure. The General Land Office is requiring that H-GAC submit a Method of Distribution for the funding to the following counties in the H-GAC service area: Austin, Brazoria, Chambers, Colorado, Fort Bend, Galveston, Liberty, Matagorda, Montgomery, Waller, Walker, and Wharton.

The Method of Distribution will include the amount of funding available to eligible jurisdictions (counties and cities) for Hurricane Harvey-related buyouts/acquisitions and infrastructure projects only. Harris County and the City of Houston are not included in this allocation and will receive funding directly from the General Land Office.

H-GAC has developed a preliminary draft Method of Distribution for planning and discussion purposes. A description of the methodology and draft allocation tables can be found on the [Method of Distribution](#) page.

The GLO acknowledges that disasters are local and so is the recovery process. Through the utilization of partnerships with the Texas Association of Regional Councils and impacted regional Councils of Governments, counties and cities, the GLO is able to oversee the local administration of funds following major disasters. From 2015 to 2017, 23 of the 24 COG regions have been impacted by Presidentially Declared Disasters.

Given the size of the impacted area and how Hurricane Harvey impacted each region differently, local control through a regional approach is vital to long-term recovery. Each COG will develop local Method of Distribution of funds for buyout / acquisitions and infrastructure projects in their region and will conduct public hearings.

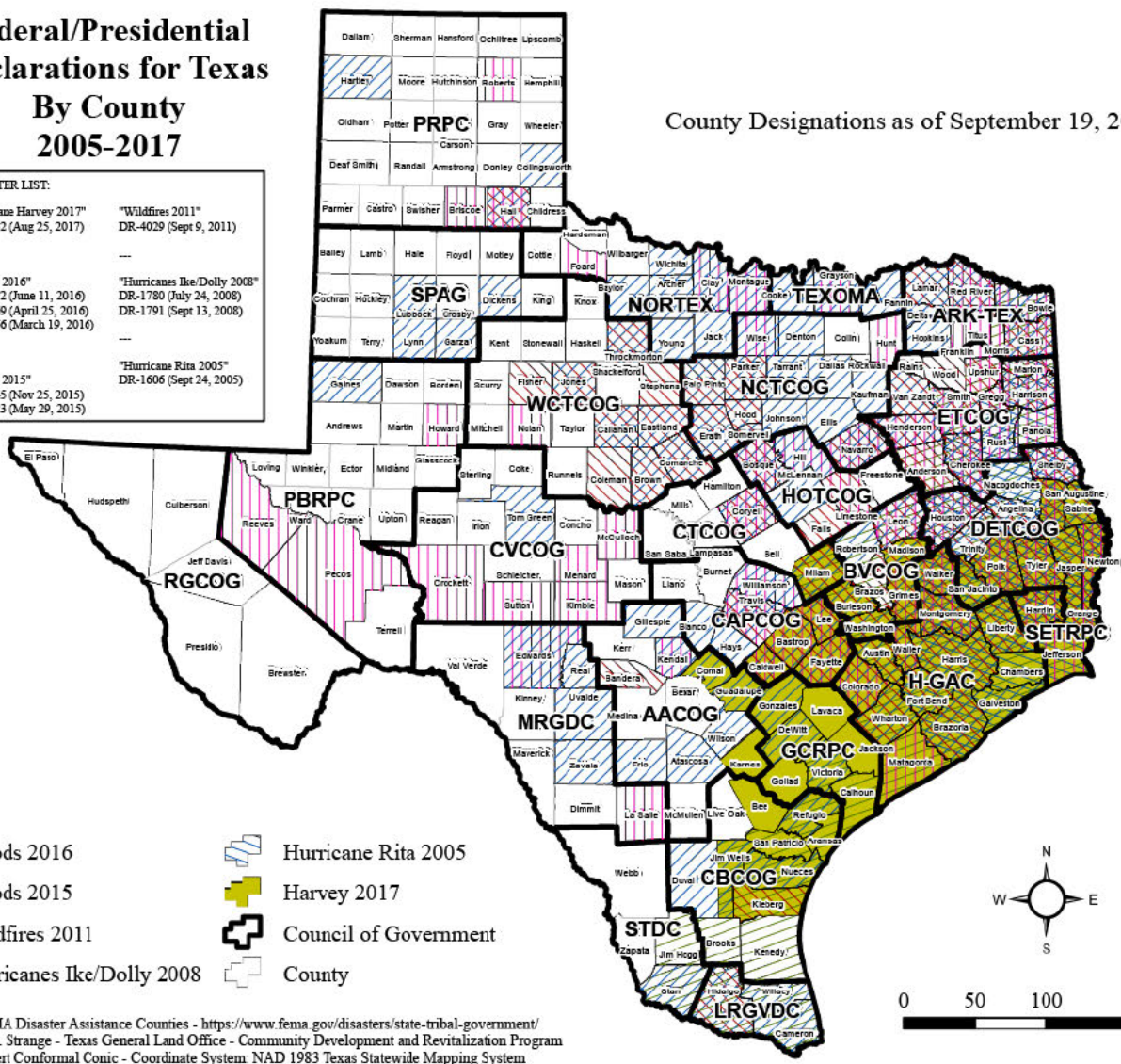

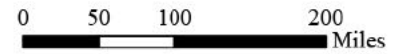

Texas Classroom Teachers Association Public Comment on Proposed New 19 TAC Chapter 152, Commissioner's Rules Concerning Examination Requirements, §152.1001, Exceptions to Examination Requirements for Individuals Certified Outside the State

Filing Date. May 30, 2018

The purpose of this notice is to publish TCTA's public comment on proposed new 19 TAC Chapter 152, Commissioner's Rules Concerning Examination Requirements, §152.1001, Exceptions to Examination Requirements for Individuals Certified Outside the State.

The Texas Education Agency (TEA) filed on April 13, 2018, the adoption of new 19 TAC §152.1001 (TRD #201801601) for publication in the April 27, 2018, issue of the *Texas Register*.

The TCTA submitted public comment on proposed new 19 TAC §152.1001 on March 2, 2018, to the TEA via email; however, due to spam filtration software, the TEA did not receive TCTA's public comment.

Following is a summary of TCTA's public comment on proposed new 19 TAC §152.1001, including TEA's response.

Comment: TCTA commented that a requirement should be added in subsection (c)(1) that eliminates individuals certified in other states from being eligible for an exemption from examination requirements if they have attempted and/or failed certification tests.

Agency Response: The agency disagrees with the recommendation to not allow individuals to qualify for the exemption if they have attempted to meet certification requirements by taking Texas examinations. Individuals who have completed the review of credentials process are instructed by the agency to take and pass required tests to establish their standard certificate. Most individuals certified in other states who gain employment in Texas are encouraged by their employing districts to establish a standard certificate prior to or by the expiration date of their one-year temporary certificate to maintain eligibility for employment in Texas. Thus, individuals attempt tests in their good faith effort to follow the state's instructions to obtain licensure. TEA staff has determined it would be unfair to ban these individuals from the opportunity to apply for and, if eligible, be granted an exemption from examination requirements while allowing the exemption for others who have never attempted the tests.

Comment: TCTA commented that subsection (c)(1)(E) and (F) should be modified to specify that, to qualify for exemption from examination requirements, an individual certified as a classroom teacher in another state should be required to have at least three academic years of verifiable, full-time teaching experience in the last five years and that an individual certified in a role other than classroom teacher in another state should be required to have at least two academic years of verifiable, full-time experience in the last five years.

Agency Response: The agency disagrees. TEA staff has determined that one year of experience for a classroom teacher and two years of experience in a role other than classroom teacher is a reasonable requirement for implementation of the rule.

Comment: TCTA commented that an additional provision should be added to subsection (d) that requires applicants certified as classroom teachers to provide a completed teacher service record that verifies and documents their teaching experience.

Agency Response: The agency agrees and will consider including this requirement in future rulemaking. For now, TEA staff have procedures in place to ensure that completed teacher service records are provided by all applicants for the exemption from examination requirements.

Comment: TCTA commented that in subsection (d)(2), the phrase "at least" should be included before the phrase "two

years of experience in the role aligned with the professional class of certificate."

Agency Response: The agency disagrees with the recommendation to modify the rule text as staff has determined this is an unnecessary change and would not substantively change the meaning of the rule.

Notice of a Proposed Renewal with Amendment of General Permit WQG200000 Authorizing the Discharge of Wastewater

The Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ or commission) is proposing to renew and amend State-Only General Permit WQG200000. This general permit authorizes the disposal of wastewater by evaporation or beneficial irrigation adjacent to water in the state from livestock manure compost operations. The proposed general permit applies to the entire state of Texas. General permits are authorized by Texas Water Code, §26.040.

PROPOSED GENERAL PERMIT. The executive director has prepared a draft general permit renewal with amendments of an existing general permit that authorizes the disposal of wastewater by evaporation or beneficial irrigation adjacent to water in the state from livestock manure compost operations. No significant degradation of high quality waters is expected and existing uses will be maintained and protected. The executive director proposes to require

regulated entities to submit a Notice of Intent to obtain authorization under the general permit.

The executive director has reviewed this action for consistency with the goals and policies of the Texas Coastal Management Program (CMP) according to Coastal Coordination Advisory Committee regulations and has determined that the action is consistent with applicable CMP goals and policies.

On the date that this notice is published, a copy of the proposed general permit and fact sheet will be available for a minimum of 30 days for viewing and copying at the TCEQ Office of the Chief Clerk located at the TCEQ Austin office, at 12100 Park 35 Circle, Building F. These documents will also be available at the TCEQ's 16 regional offices and on the TCEQ website at <https://www.tceq.texas.gov/permitting/wastewater/general/index.html>.

PUBLIC COMMENT/PUBLIC MEETING. You may submit public comments or request a public meeting about this proposed general permit. The purpose of a public meeting is to provide the opportunity to submit written or oral comment or to ask questions about the proposed general permit. Generally, the TCEQ will hold a public meeting if the executive director determines that there is a significant degree of public interest in the proposed general permit or if requested by a state legislator. A public meeting is not a contested case hearing.

Written public comments must be received by the Office of the Chief Clerk, MC 105, TCEQ, P.O. Box 13087, Austin, Texas 78711-3087 or electronically at <https://www.tceq.texas.gov/about/comments.html> within 30 days from the date this notice is published.

The stakeholders for this project requested to join the implementation efforts of the Greater Trinity River Bacteria I-Plan Project, which has an approved I-Plan in a large area adjacent to the project's watershed. On June 15, 2017, the Coordination Committee for the Greater Trinity River Bacteria I-Plan agreed to accept the addition of the Sycamore Creek watershed to the existing I-Plan.

After the public comment period, the TCEQ may revise the draft TMDL if appropriate. The final TMDL will then be considered by the commission for adoption. The RAF utilizes appropriate statistical data to measure the affordable housing need and available resources in the 13 State Service Regions that are used for planning purposes. The RAF also allocates funding to rural and urban subregions within each region. The Department has flexibility in determining variables to be used in the RAF, per §2306.1115(a)(3) of the Texas Governing Code, "the department shall develop a formula that...includes other factors determined by the department to be relevant to the equitable distribution of housing funds." The RAF is revised annually to reflect current data, respond to public comment, and better assess regional housing needs and available resources.

The Single Family HOME Investment Partnerships Program ("HOME"), Multifamily HOME, Housing Tax Credit ("HTC") and State Housing Trust Fund ("SHTF") program RAFs each use slightly different formulas because the programs have different eligible activities, households, and geographical service areas. For example, §2306.111(c) of the Texas Government Code requires that 95% of HOME funding be set aside for non-participating jurisdictions ("non-PJs"). Therefore, the Single Family and Multifamily HOME RAFs only use need and available resource data for non-PJs.

The RAF methodology explains the use of factors, in keeping with the statutory requirements, which include the need for housing assistance, the availability of housing resources, and other factors relevant to the equitable distribution of housing funds in urban and rural areas of the state.

Since Hurricanes Katrina and Rita in 2005, Texas Appleseed has worked with a network of organizations in Texas, including housing advocates, policy experts, and grassroots community groups, to ensure that all Texas families are able to recover in the wake of a natural disaster, that communities are rebuilt to be more resilient, and that all families have the opportunity to live in safe, decent neighborhoods with equal access to educational and economic opportunity.</p> <p>We do not believe that H-GAC's MOD is compliant with GLO requirements as it does not follow the MOD form provided by GLO and consists only of data and allocation tables. It provides no further information on the details of the buyout or infrastructure programs, nor does it contain any information on the public participation process, how HGAC's MOD furthers long term recovery, unmet</p>	<p>As outlined in a Citizen Participation Plan submitted to the GLO on May 18, 2018, H-GAC implemented a media campaign using local English and non-English newspapers to inform and invite the public to four Public Planning Meetings and two Public Hearings. H-GAC posted notices of these meetings in relevant Papers of General Circulation for all 12 eligible counties and on the H-GAC, General Land Office, and the Secretary of State websites.</p> <p>H-GAC accepted written comments on the draft Method of Distribution beginning at 4:00 p.m. on Thursday, June 21, 2018 through 4:00 p.m. Friday, July 6, 2018. Comments were accepted by mail, through an online form, and in person at two public hearings.</p> <p>The Method of Distribution does not include a factor for Low- to Moderate-Income Households (LMI) and is based solely on housing damage, weighted for severity. The methodology behind this weighting are available on H-GAC's website.</p> <p>The requirement of 70% of the aggregate CDBG-DR funds to be utilized for the benefit of low- or moderate-income population is established in the Federal Register and is reiterated in the GLOS's State Action Plan. The responsibility for developing</p>

			<p>housing needs, the LMI income requirement, or affirmatively furthering fair housing. HGAC must produce a complete and compliant MOD for public comment.</p> <p>We offer the following comments on what needs to be included in HGAC’s MOD:</p> <p>A. Local Buyout and Acquisition Program:</p> <p>Program guidelines for this program must be developed in a transparent process with extensive community input. Local communities must have a citizen participation process for drafting buyout guidelines. Regardless of whether these planned buyouts are voluntary or mandatory, relocating, away from an existing community or a home that has been in a family for generations, can be difficult and even traumatic. Without planning and community buy-in, a voluntary individual buyout program can result in a patchwork of empty and occupied homes, creating a blighted neighborhood. One of the critical issues in ensuring a successful buyout program is equity and ensuring that program rules and processes do not have a disparate impact on particular groups of homeowners.</p> <p>Local buyout and acquisition programs must also prioritize LMI households in floodways and floodplains, who have the least resources with which to relocate on their own, leaving them a choice between housing instability and potential homelessness, or continuing to live in homes that may be structurally compromised or present health risks because of mold. It is particularly critical for LMI families that this buyout program includes not only acquisition and demolition, but relocation payments and other assistance and incentives as well. As the Federal Register Notice states, “a buyout program that merely pays homeowners to leave their existing homes does not result in a low- and moderate-income household occupying a residential structure and, thus, cannot meet the requirements of the LMH national objective.” (83 FR 5863) Local buyout programs should include plans to build housing in safer areas.</p> <p>Low- and moderate-income households must be provided with enough funds that the choice to move is a realistic one (or to ensure that they can actually move to a safer area in the case of mandatory buyouts.) The worst-case scenario is that families who accept a buyout are unable to find housing in safer areas and are forced to move back into their original or less safe neighborhoods.</p> <p>The decision of whether to use pre- or post-storm home value is an important one. In particular, using the pre-storm value of a home to determine disaster recovery program benefit limits often has a discriminatory impact on the basis of race or ethnicity as well. Following Hurricane Katrina, the National Fair Housing Alliance (NFHA), the Greater New Orleans Fair Housing Action Center (GNOFAC), and African-American homeowners sued the State of Louisiana and the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development (HUD) alleging racial discrimination in the State’s CDBG-DR funded Road Home Program, which provided grants to homeowners to repair or rebuild their homes. The original grant formula was based on the pre-storm value of a home, which resulted in African-American homeowners receiving less repair money than White homeowners, because their homes were located in neighborhoods with lower home values based on market discrimination and the legacy of segregation. Many African-American families were left unable to complete repairs or return home or living in</p>	<p>specific projects that meet this threshold will rest with local governments. In the event that local governments are unable to deliver eligible projects, H-GAC has recommended a reallocation hierarchy that will redirect funding which cannot be utilized to jurisdictions that have the highest percentage of housing damage.</p> <p>H-GAC is not proposing as part of this Method of Distribution any additional requirements on local implementation of buyout/acquisition or infrastructure projects beyond those that have been established in in the Federal Register or GLO’s State Action Plan. H-GAC will provide the feedback regarding additional policies for buyouts/acquisitions to the GLO.</p>
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				<p>Using this methodology means that HGAC is budgeting for unmet housing needs with the expectation that most LMI households, who fall into lower level damage categories if they are represented at all, are not severely damaged and will not need their homes rebuilt. While the average FVL for non-LMI homeowners was about twice that of ELI owners, the average income for non-LMI owners is over 14 times that of ELI owners. This methodology underrepresents LMI housing needs by income level, particularly misrepresenting the level of unmet rental housing need for ELI families. HGAC's use of FVL damage categories to weight the geographic distribution of CDBG-DR funds, therefore, will end up allocating resources away from areas that need them the most, affecting not only those families, but those communities as a whole.</p> <p>Texas Appleseed supports the use of a data-based formula to allocate federal disaster recovery funds. But that formula must be adjusted to account for deficiencies in FEMA and other data and ensure that the needs of all Texans affected by Hurricane Harvey are taken into account. We strongly recommend that HGAC use the methodology proposed by the Texas Low Income Housing Information Service (Texas Housers) in its comments on the draft Action Plan - or a similar methodology - which relates a household's FVL to their income, thereby considering the level of impact on a household, acknowledging the loss valuation variations produced by the FEMA/HUD methodology, and more accurately counts households with unmet housing needs that are the least able to recover and most vulnerable to housing insecurity. FEMA damage levels (FVL) are not adequate to determine allocation of funding. They rely on personal property damage for renters, which undercounts these households, leaving them out of the calculation of need. The "weighted damage" calculation will also further undercount households that were found to have low FVL levels due to the pre-existing condition or low value pre-storm value of their home. As a result, H-GAC should not rely entirely on this data to determine where funding will be distributed. The income (and hence ability to pay) of disaster survivors should be considered when determining whether they will require funding to recover. One way to accomplish this is to utilize the methodology recommended by Texas Housers in response to the Draft Action Plan. This methodology factors in the income level (ELI/VLI/LI) of the household when a threshold for unmet need. In other words, there is a lower threshold for unmet need among lower income households because they are more likely to require outside aid to recover. More research and planning is needed to impactfully and equitably designate buyout funding. The Buyout and Acquisition Program's allocation methodology is seriously flawed. The first problem is that it assumes damage weights will reflect the suitability of these areas for buyouts, not to mention the fact that the damage was caused by flooding, as opposed to wind. Within the H-GAC region, the majority of Harvey damage claims appears to be, in fact, caused by flooding and not wind,</p>	<p>The GLO requires that the Method of Distribution be based on data that represents actual needs for a comprehensive data source. H-GAC is aware that there are other data sources available. However, the FEMA data is the most comprehensive data source for the region, and it is imperative that data be consistent between all 12 counties and 118 cities in the project area.</p> <p>H-GAC reviewed the methodology recommended by Texas Housers in response to the State Action Plan. However, it determined that its own methodology, which included the full range of damage claims, including the Minor-Low and Minor-High categories, was more suitable for the purposes of establishing a Method of Distribution.</p> <p>H-GAC is not proposing as part of this Method of Distribution any additional requirements on local implementation of buyout/acquisition or infrastructure projects beyond those that have been established in the Federal Register or in the GLO's State Action Plan. However, we will share the comments regarding additional policies for buyouts/acquisitions and infrastructure projects with the GLO.</p>

				<p>which is not the case in all parts of the disaster area. However, there are areas such as Wharton County and the most-impacted zipcodes in Colorado County, where there are also considerable wind damage claims, according to the map provided in the GLO's State Action Plan. For those wind-damaged units, buyouts will not solve the problem, which is why it is necessary to distinguish between FVL caused by various forces in order to truly consider suitability of damaged homes for buyouts. Second, local jurisdictions and H-GAC must make use of data available through the National Flood Insurance Program about concentrations of repetitive loss properties in order to intelligently allocate this funding. The Community Rating System (CRS) offers jurisdictions advice on locating concentration areas of repetitive loss properties, collecting remote data on these properties and determining the cause of the ongoing flooding problems there. This type of investigation will be essential in locating areas that are suited to buyouts, as opposed to individual homes that were damaged and should be rebuilt with mitigation in mind or areas where poor infrastructure is to blame. Small amounts of funding are not sufficient to engage in a well-planned buyout program that doesn't result in "checker-boarding" of neighborhoods (lack of concentration of buyouts in affected areas) or strain on resources and city services (due to the continued need to serve areas that have been partially bought out). One million dollars, which is the cutoff for any jurisdiction to receive its own buyout funding (before it is rolled up to the next highest jurisdiction) is not enough to fund a significant buyout program that doesn't exacerbate these problems. Buyout programs need to be concentrated in areas that have repetitive flood losses that can only be addressed through an organized acquisition program that offers households sufficient money to move to an equivalent home in a safer area. Finally, when funding is 'rolled up' to the county level, there should be a requirement to serve areas that didn't have a large enough damage total to have their own funding allocation. It makes sense for jurisdictions NOT to receive small amounts of funding that are insufficient to engage in meaningful recovery or mitigation activities, but these areas shouldn't be left without funding. Otherwise, smaller jurisdictions with fewer housing units may end up not getting access to the funds necessary for recovery.</p>	<p>The \$1 million minimum threshold for buyout/acquisition projects is a policy established by the GLO, and nothing in H-GAC's MOD would enjoin a local government from developing larger buyout/acquisition projects. Additionally, H-GAC has recommended a reallocation hierarchy that will redirect funding which cannot be utilized to jurisdictions that have the highest percentage of housing damage.</p>

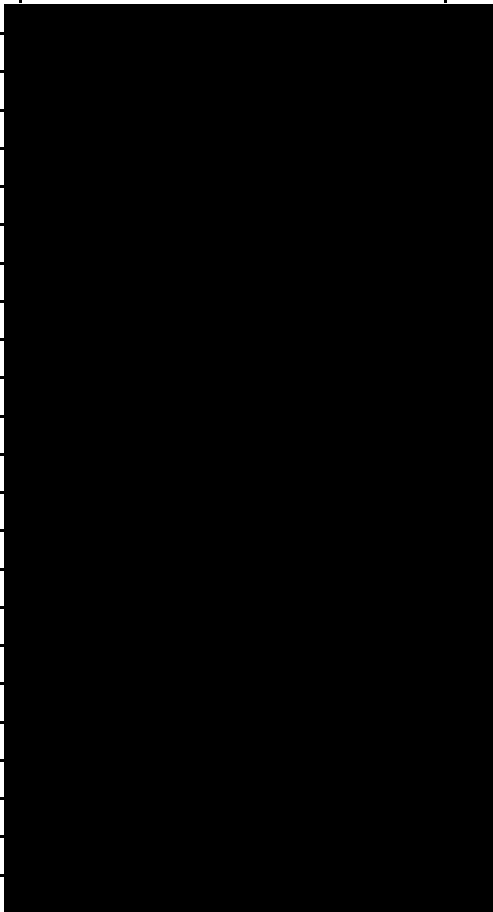
