### Citizen Participation

Below is a description addressing how the COG complied with their Citizen Participation Plan regarding citizen and non-governmental organization outreach, and any additional efforts exceeding GLO minimum public participation requirements:

H-GAC posted the Method of Distribution planning document on the H-GAC website during the evening of May 30, 2018. H-GAC posted a revised Draft Method of Distribution for public comment on the H-GAC website during the afternoon on June 21.

State guidelines require H-GAC to submit this MOD by July 17, 2018, and to have an extensive public participation and comment process. An overview of H-GAC's public participation and comment process can be found in the paragraphs that follow. For specific information, see the Citizen Participation Plan (Appendix A).

From June 4, 2018 to June 7, 2018, H-GAC conducted four Public Planning Meetings with local leaders and community members and one Advocacy Group Meeting (input session) with local advocacy groups to inform them of the Method of Distribution process and to seek input on local priorities. H-GAC held two formal Public Hearings on June 28 and 29, 2018, to receive public comment on the proposed method of distribution. Three eblasts were sent to a distribution list of approximately 820 stakeholders prior to the Public Planning Meetings and Public Hearings. Three separate eblasts were distributed to local advocacy groups, inviting them to participate in the Advocacy Group Meeting. For specific information, see the Citizen Participation Plan (Appendix A). Public meetings were advertised in the June and July newsletter for the H-GAC's Community and Environmental Department, as well as through the agency's Facebook and Twitter pages.

H-GAC also discussed the Method of Distribution at monthly H-GAC Board of Directors meetings and provided for comment. H-GAC sent a letter to federal and state elected officials representing constituents in the project area, notifying them of the project, upcoming Public Planning Meetings (4 total) and Public Hearings (2 total), and other pertinent project information.

H-GAC posted notices of the Public Planning Meetings and Public Hearings in the Anahuac Progress, Bay City Tribune, Brazoria Facts, Colorado County Citizen, Conroe Courier, Fort Bend Herald, Forward Times, Galveston County News, Houston Chronicle, Huntsville Item, La Informacion, Liberty County Vindicator, Sealy News, Vietnam Moi News, Waller Times and Wharton Journal Spectator; on the Secretary of State's Texas Register/Open meetings webpage and the GLO's partner web page; and on the H-GAC website at <u>www.h-gac.com/harvey</u>. Advocacy groups received a separate invitation to the input session.

H-GAC accepted written comments in person, by mail, and through an online comment form on the H-GAC website during the public comment period June 21, 2018, to July 6, 2018.

# **Long-Term Planning and Recovery**

Below is an explanation of how the COG's method of distribution fosters long-term community recovery that is forwardlooking and focused on permanent restoration of infrastructure, housing and the local economy and primarily, how these activities will contribute to the long-term recovery and restoration of housing in the HUD-identified most impacted and distressed areas and/or other impacted areas.

Over the past 10 years, the Houston-Galveston region has been subjected to extensive damage due to direct hits from two major hurricanes (Ike and Harvey) and two significant flood events (Memorial Day and Tax Day). Prior to Harvey, the region received funding that has been used to foster long-term recovery that sought to target permanent restoration of infrastructure, housing, and the local economy through various programs and projects. Our goal is to do the same in the aftermath of Harvey by taking what we have learned from each storm and applying that knowledge to prevent further damage of the same types.

While the GLO is handling the restoration of housing, communities in the Houston-Galveston region will focus on conducting the buyout and acquisition and infrastructure programs that reduce repetitive loss and risk to human health and safety, and improve critical infrastructure that was damaged or failed to function. Both programs will be conducted by eligible communities through various types of eligible activities defined by HUD and the GLO.

The overall goal of rebuilding efforts in the Houston-Galveston region is to establish communities that can withstand or rebound from future disasters.

# **Unmet Housing Needs**

Below is an explanation of how unmet housing needs will be addressed or how economic revitalization or infrastructure activies will contribute to long-term recovery and restoration of housing in the HUD-identified most impacted and distressed areas and/or other impacted areas.

Buyout/acquisition and infrastructure projects are critical to the long-term recovery and restoration of housing in the Houston-Galveston region.

Buyout/acquisition projects will focus on removal of homes and residents from harm's way, thereby preventing repetitive loss and the possibility of catastrophic human loss. Unmet housing needs of those located in these areas will be addressed and resolved through various eligible activities that will be planned and implemented by eligible communities.

Infrastructure projects will focus on repairs or strengthening of infrastructure crucial making communities safe and inhabitable. Unmet housing needs of those located in these areas will be addressed and resolved through various eligible activities that will be planned and implemented by eligible communities.

# **Affirmatively Furthering Fair Housing Statement**

All subrecipients will certify that they will affirmatively further fair housing ("AFFH") in their grant agreements, and will receive GLO training and technical assistance in meeting their AFFH obligations. Additionally, all project applications will undergo AFFH review by GLO before approval of projects. Such review will include assessment of a proposed project's area demography, socioeconomic characteristics, housing configuration and needs, educational, transportation, and health care opportunities, environmental hazards or concerns, and all other factors material to the AFFH determination. Applications should show that projects are likely to lessen area racial, ethnic, and low-income concentrations, and/or promote affordable housing in low-poverty, nonminority areas in response to natural hazard related impacts.

## Low-to Moderate Income Requirement

Below is an explanation of how the method of distributionmeet the 70 percent low-to moderate income (LMI) requirement for each program. This means that 70 percent of the funds must benefit areas that are 51% or more LMI households or benefit households with incomes below 80% of the Area Median Income (AMI).

Per requirements of the State of Texas Plan for Disaster Recovery: Hurricane Harvey June 25, 2018, submitted to the United States Department Housing and Urban Development (HUD) by the Texas General Land Office (GLO), at least 70% of the program funds will benefit low- and moderate-income (LMI) persons. All entities will be required to follow established rules and regulations related to the funding received.

## Local Buyout and Acquisition Program Method of Distribution Detail

The COG is required to prepare a method of distribution for the local buyout and acquisition program funds between the eligible cities, counties, and entities with eminent domain authority. The GLO has directed the COG to use a direct allocation technique based on objective and verifiable data.
